

Review of PE and Sport Action Plan 2015 / 16

KEY PRIORITY 4: PE (Curriculum focus)

Continue to make effective use of the Sports Premium Funding to improve resources and develop learning and teaching across the school.

Results of Actions:

- The school did not purchase a package this year as it was decided that in the previous year, there were elements which we didn't use and that it was not therefore best value. Instead, we sourced our own training and support via known providers and contacts within the Sports Partnership.
- A number of new staff joined the school in 2015 / 16 and in order to continue to promote and deliver "RealPE" we accessed training for them. We also extended staff understanding and delivery through additional training on "Real Gymnastics." The course was attended by SH and information dissemination at staff meetings. Staff meetings also focused on developing the plan of where the elements of "Real PE" were being taught in each year group across the school year. SH is continuing to work on this. (Training costs - £390)
- Sports coaches have continued to be used to work alongside teachers to provide quality teaching and also CPD opportunities for staff. 4 members of staff worked alongside a Football (FA) coach to develop their skills and raise their confidence in delivering football skills and modified games. As a part of this work, teachers had the opportunity to complete a range of online activities to gain a Teacher Award. The materials and the expertise gained can be drawn on in subsequent years.
- Cricket coaching was also provided for pupils in Years 5 and 6 and teachers worked alongside the coach to develop their knowledge of the game and their skills in delivering this element of the curriculum. (Cost – £109)
- We have continued to employ a hockey coach one afternoon per week, to raise the profile of the game and to provide a pathway to club sport outside of school. The impact on the quality of play has been seen in the school's success in local and county tournaments. (Cost £682.50)
- The school has accessed competitive activities through the Sports Partnership school games schedule and where possible taken several teams, rather than one team, to events in order to give competitive opportunities to as many pupils as possible. Sports premium funding was used to provide transport to and from these events. (Transport costs - £195) (Staffing costs - £340)
- A review of equipment was carried out by SG and SH and additional resources purchased to support curriculum delivery. This included small equipment such as balls, rackets, training bibs, hurdles but also larger pieces of equipment, including new netball posts and two sets of 5-a-side football goals. (Cost - £300, £528 & £120)

Future Planning / Tasks

- On-going monitor and review of curricular provision across the school. Include review of progression and delivery of the 'RealPE' programme across the school.
- Contact Margret Stevens regarding updating orienteering maps for St Michael's so that permanent trails can be set up.
- Provide PE Coordinator opportunities for SH in order to develop this role / responsibility.
- Continue to access up to date information and development opportunities via the Youth Sports Trust.
- Review the use of IT in the PE curriculum and increase opportunities to use iPads as a tool to share and review performance.
- Closely monitor participation in Sports Clubs and physical activities during extra-curricular time. Promote during assemblies, newsletter, sports notice board and aim for 100% participation across KS1 and KS2.
- Coordinator to monitor quality of teaching and learning in PE to assess impact of training.

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Results of Actions: (Continued)

- New sports kit was also purchased for both boys' and girls' teams. School Councillors worked with children in their classes to design kit using an online tool. The final design was voted on and the kit was available for end of year tournaments. This raised the profile of and interest in inter school competitive sports. (Cost - £754)
- An audit of participation in events shows that approximately 60% of pupils in KS2 took part in at least one competition. It also shows that 75% of our PP representing the school in sport. Major successes included the netball team who progressed to the county finals.
- A wide range of physical activity and outdoor learning clubs have been provided by school staff and external coaches after school. New clubs, including Orienteering and Forest Schools, have been added to the schedule. An audit of participation in clubs shows that 61% of the pupils in KS2 accessed at least one physical activity club during the course of 2015 / 16. A slight reduction on the previous year but this still demonstrates that opportunities to be active after school day are successfully being promoted through our extra-curricular programme.
- SH attended the PE Coordinators conference which included a link between the delivery of the PE curriculum with the Maths Curriculum. The Maths of the Day session also included an opportunity for the school's Maths coordinator to join the conference and CA therefore attended to consider how links between the two subjects could be developed. (Cost - £495)
- An application for a Sports Mark Award (third year in a row) is in progress and the school will be informed of the outcome at the end of Sept / beginning of October.
- New Playground Markings are being well used by all children at playtime thereby increasing opportunities for physical activities during the children's free time.
- Sports Ambassadors took responsibility for leading a range of activities across the school year including Sports Relief events which involved the whole school and also Sports Day. These activities develop our pupils' confidence and self-esteem and provide positive role models in sport for our younger pupils.

Other incidental costs to support the delivery of PE and Sport include: Affiliation fees, Drama presentation linked to Sport and Healthy lifestyles, awards for Sports Day, payment for clubs and support for curriculum.
